III <u>MINUTES:</u>

<u>Resolved</u> that the minutes of the meeting of the Tekapo Community Board held on 28 January 2013 be confirmed and adopted as the correct record of the meeting.

MATTERS UNDER ACTION:

1. Civil Defence

The Chairman reported that the Civil Defence Officer had organised two coordinators and an Area Coordinator and that he was seeking someone to lead the welfare team. He said approval had been gained for the radio to be located in the Fire Station.

2. Pete Speedy Improvements to Reserve Area on Lakeside Drive:

The Chairman advised that he had met with Mr Speedy regarding the work which was being undertaken in the area. Further soil and sowing of grass was being planned for the autumn. The Chairman and Community Facilities Manager were to meet again with Mr Speedy.

The Chairman raised on-going problem of the Car Park situated on the corner of Pioneer Drive and State Highway 8 which doubles as a look out. Campers seem to be camping there and using the neighbouring properties for toileting. The Chairman raised the question as to whether the Carpark is necessary.

4. Community Centre

The Community Facilities Manager updated the Board on progress with the rebuilding project. He said progress is slow of late with the delay centred on the installation of the large windows and kitchen detail; decisions required at present are regarding the dish washers and the layout of the kitchen. Variations to the plans have been approved with additional storage added and also the inclusion of the footpath. The completion date as per Contract is May 2013.

5. Campervan Dump Station and Car Park.

Copies of the site plan for the Lakeside Drive Carpark and Effluent Dump Station were circulated for approval.

It was agreed that the plan be amended to include a gravel footpath extending from a 'Y' junction towards the supermarket and village centre area.

The Asset Manager said it was intended to provide the contractors with two options for pricing the project, viz for completion by the end of April 2013 or by November 2013. This was in response to recent high quotes received for some work because of contractors' commitments in Christchurch and to the Genesis canal repair project.

Mr Munro tabled a letter received from Professor John Henshaw, Professor of Astronomy at The University of Canterbury and the Chair, of The Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve Board. This letter was addressed to Mr Bernie Haar, Asset Manager, and provided the Council with some background information on Lake Tekapo Lighting and Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve. Mr Munro also spoke of the December 2012 RASNZ DarkSkies Group of the Royal Astronomical Society of New Zealand and finally an information brochure also distributed by RASNZ. RE: Tekapo Canal Remediation Project - End of Season 1 works

I am pleased to write to you to report that Genesis Energy is nearing the completion of the first season of works which has seen the re-lining of two sections of the Tekapo Canal.

It has been an extremely successful construction season, and we have been fortunate with the settled weather allowing us to progress works ahead of schedule. We anticipate the canal coming back into service earlier than the scheduled date of 21 April 2013.

Over the next several days, we will be re-watering the two sections of the canal that have been de-watered for the re-lining works. We will also be removing the four cofferdams that have been in place since works commenced on 9 January 2013, which have allowed the two sections of the canal to be re-lined in the dry.

The removal of the cofferdams will result in some sediment suspension in the water column, which will move down the canal once flow is re-started. Though settling of much of the sediment is expected, a sediment plume may be visible in Lake Pukaki as the canal water enters Lake Pukaki via Tekapo B Power Station. We expect this sediment plume to settle out quickly. Genesis Energy will be installing silt barriers along the canal to limit the migration of sediment as much as is practicable, and we will be monitoring the water quality during cofferdam removal to ensure we remain well within our consented suspended solid limits.

Over the period April – July 2013, there will be external earthworks occurring at the Maryburn Fill section of the Tekapo Canal, in preparation for the re-lining of this section of the Tekapo Canal during season 2. I will be in touch as soon as possible once the date for the season 2 works has been determined.

I would like to remind you that Genesis Energy may operate its control gates at any time for operation purposes, and as a response to potential heavy inflows into Lake Tekapo. The public are asked not to enter watercourses downstream of Genesis Energy structures in case of sudden flow changes.



I would like to express my sincere thanks for your on-going support during the season 1 works, and look forward to meeting with you again prior to season 2 works commencing.

Ellie and Rebecca gave an overview of the progress of the Tekapo Canal Remediation Project. The works are ahead of schedule due to the settled weather. State Highway 8 bridge works are scheduled to be completed at the end of March, and the canal around the 8.17 km culvert is being reconstructed.

Ellie explained that when the four cofferdams are removed and the canal flow is re-initiated, there will be a pulse of sediment that travels down the canal and is flushed into Lake Pukaki. Genesis Energy will be installing air curtains within the canal to trap and settle some of the sediment, and will also be monitoring the canal water to ensure any discharges remain well within our Total Suspended Solids limit of 100g/m³.

During late March – July 2013, external earthworks will be undertaken on the Maryburn Fill section of the Canal batters and adjacent canal roads in preparation for the season 2 re-lining in this section of the canal. Heavy trucks will require the use of Farm Bridge 3, and as such, Genesis Energy intends to close section of the canal for public vehicle access for Health and Safety reasons. A gate will be installed at the Tekapo B headpond end of the canal which will still allow access for foot traffic to as far as the third farm bridge.

Dates for season 2 works have not been set yet, as there is a consultation process to go through with Meridian Energy first. We will let the Community Board know as soon as the dates have been set.

At time of meeting, Genesis Energy was spilling 20 cumecs at Gate 16 into the Tekapo River. We do not anticipate having to spill more than this again during this outage, however if we experience a significant rainfall event spill may increase again, in which case our safety procedures will be followed.

The Community Board queried whether Genesis Energy intended to open up the canal road again after the project is complete. The Community Board consider it is an attraction for tourists to cycle and walk along. Rebecca said this discussion being held within Genesis Energy. There are safety considerations to take into account. Genesis Energy will communicate any proposed outcomes of this discussion with the Community Board.

Ellie reminded the Board of the bus trip along the canal which we are running on Sunday 24 March. If the Board can't make this trip, we're happy to organise another one for the Board to see the works at a later more convenient date.


International Dark Sky Reserve

In June 2012 over 4367 square kilometres of New Zealand's South Island were proclaimed as an International Dark Sky Reserve, making it the largest in the world. The Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve (IDSR), comprised of the Aoraki/Mt. Cook National Park and the Mackenzie Basin, is the third such dark sky reserve in the world.

International Dark-Sky Association's Executive Director Bob Parks remarks, "The new reserve is coming in at a 'Gold' level status. That means the skies there are almost totally free from light pollution. To put it simply, it is one of the best stargazing sites on Earth."

The new reserve recognizes that the night sky has played a critical role in the area's history. As its first residents, the Maori used the night sky not only to navigate to the island but also integrated astronomy and star lore into their culture and daily lives. The reserve seeks to honour that history by keeping the night sky as a protected and integral part of the area's natural and cultural landscape. It is a perfect place to protect and honour those traditions as the IDSR's Mackenzie Basin has the clearest, darkest and the most spectacular night sky in New Zealand.





Recognition of the Aoraki Mackenzie area as an International Dark Sky Reserve resulted from the dreams and hard work of many individuals and organisations, both within the local area and from around New Zealand. The application document was formally presented to the International Dark-Sky Association with the support of The Mackenzie District Council, The Department of Conservation, The University of Canterbury Mt John Observatory, and the Royal Astronomical Society of New Zealand. INTERNATIONAL DARK SKY PLACES

geologically important features. Night sky tourism is not only a significant source of income for members of the local population. but is woven into local culture in providing a point of reflection on the night sky for local people and visitors in understanding and experiencing the night sky.

Concept promotes starlight destinations as places where history, science, aesthetics and spirituality may be interpreted for members of the public alongside viewing of the night sky.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Assess your requirements. Determine if or where you really need light. Don't use light as "decoration" or for visual effect at night.

Direct light where it is needed. Remember that at night, less is more. Concentrate fixtures only where needed. Choose fixtures that can be aimed, and keep them aimed towards the ground.

Avoid alare. Glare actually compromises safety, as it can render an attacker or intruder invisible. Glare is often caused by an unshielded source, such as a fixture where the bulb is visible.

Use lower wattage bulbs. More light does not mean more safety. The dark adapted eye can best see at night when there is uniformity of illumination. A bright light against a dark background causes pupil contraction, so the dark background beyond the bright light is invisible.

Use "full cutoff" fixtures, which means that no light is emitted at or above the horizontal.

Make sure that the light source is not visible when viewing the fixture straight on.

When choosing lighting avoid harsh or blue white lamps. Choose "warm white" or lamps rated at 4000°K or less.

Keep in mind the motto "Lights Down, Stars Up".

WHY

There are at least nine reasons to reduce light pollution and to protect the natural night sky. They go beyond nature conservation to touch upon appropriate design and land development control policies.

- To preserve the ecological integrity of natural environments.
- To ensure the full enjoyment of a wilderness experience.
- To appreciate the integrity, character and beauty of rural landscapes.
- To protect and present the commemorative integrity (authenticity) of cultural sites.
- To preserve traditions that relate to celestial mythologies, navigation and other cultural aspects.
- To protect human health, both medical and psychological.
- To contribute to energy efficiency.
- To benefit scientific and amateur astronomy and the right to enjoy the night sky.
- To improve personal security through non-glare lighting in urban areas.

The Dark Sky Reserve
